DANIEL BALDWIN, CONDUCTOR

Daniel Baldwin is the head of the Music Department and since 1997 has served as director of orchestral activities at Luther College. Baldwin earned the bachelor of music (cello) degree from Furman University and master of music (cello) and doctor of musical arts (orchestral conducting) degrees from the University of Texas at Austin. Prior to his arrival at Luther College, Baldwin served as director of orchestral activities at Central Washington University (Ellensburg, Washington).

Baldwin received his formal training in string pedagogy as a teacher in the University of Texas String Project, perhaps the most comprehensive program of its kind in North America. Phyllis Young, director of the String Project for 35 years, was Baldwin's cello teacher during his studies at the University of Texas. He studied conducting with Henry Charles Smith, Cornelius Eberhardt, Sung Kwak, Walter Ducloux, and Fiora Contino

Baldwin has served as music director of the Central Kentucky Youth Orchestra and the Transylvania Youth Orchestra of the Brevard (North Carolina) Music Center, the largest summer music festival in the South. A 1991 conducting fellow of the Conductor's Institute of the University of South Carolina and formerly a cellist with the Brevard Music Center Orchestra, Baldwin maintains an active schedule as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor. Since 2007 he has served as musical and artistic director for the Lake Chelan Bach Fest in North Central Washington state.

The Luther College Symphony Orchestra, Luther's largest and oldest orchestral ensemble, is conducted by Dr. Daniel Baldwin. Eighty-six student musicians, representing a variety of academic disciplines, perform with Symphony Orchestra. Many are also involved in chamber music, choir, band, or a jazz ensemble.

The orchestra tours regularly in the United States, and every four years, it spends a month studying, rehearsing and performing in Vienna. Under Dr. Baldwin's leadership, the orchestra has completed 16 American tours and 6 European tours.

In addition to regular concerts featuring masterworks of the orchestral literature, Symphony Orchestra takes

great pride in performing new music on a regular basis. Since 2001, the orchestra has presented six world premieres. It also collaborates with Luther College choirs in performances of major choral-orchestral works and in annual *Christmas at Luther* performances.

Nine chairs in the Luther College Symphony Orchestra benefit from endowed scholarships generously provided by Luther donors. Additionally, the Richard C. and Joann M. Hemp Family Prize for Orchestral Performance is awarded annually to a senior student in Symphony Orchestra. Selection is by audition and recognizes exceptional performance, talent, musicianship, and leadership.



IGOR KALNIN, VIOLINIST

Igor Kalnin has performed internationally as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestra leader. A native of Russia, he started his professional musical career as a faculty member at Glinka State Conservatory in Nizhny Novgorod, Russia, and later joined Chamber Orchestra Kremlin in Moscow. After relocating to the United States in 2004, he served as violin instructor at Yale University and as leader for several orchestras on the East Coast and in the Midwest. Presently, he is assistant professor of violin at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa and concertmaster of Sinfonia da Camera in Urbana, Illinois. During the summer season, he teaches and conducts at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan, where he also serves as concertmaster of Blue Lake Festival and Opera Orchestras.

Winner of international and national competitions, Kalnin has performed as a soloist with orchestras in Europe, Asia, and America. As a recitalist and chamber musician, he appeared in prestigious venues around the world, including Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York and Rachmaninov Hall at Moscow Conservatory in Russia. He is a founding member of Duo MemDi, a forefront chamber group, which focuses on performing repertoire by memory and increasing diversity in the world of classical music. He is also a member of Luther College Piano Quartet, which performs and teaches master classes in the Midwest area.

Throughout his career, Kalnin has been passionate about teaching students of all ages. His college and pre-college students have won regional, state, and international competitions and have been accepted to prestigious music programs. As a clinician, he has given master classes at universities, conservatories, music centers, and public schools throughout the United States and internationally.

Kalnin holds an undergraduate diploma with distinction from Balakirev Music College, as well as graduate and post-graduate diplomas with distinction from Glinka State Conservatory in Nizhny Novgorod, Russia. In the United States, he has earned an artist diploma from Yale University and a doctor of musical arts degree from Michigan State University. His teachers included Walter Verdehr, Hyo Kang, Galy Afanasiev, and Felix Forshtock.

The Symphony Orchestra's culminating performance was at Vienna's famed Musikverein.

Vienna, Austria, is a city of exquisite architecture, major art museums, storied coffee houses, and, of course, world-class orchestras. Known as "The City of Music," it's where Beethoven, Mozart, Haydn, Strauss, and Schubert lived, and where 10,000 people continue to take in live classical music each night. And it was where 86 Luther students lived, practiced, and performed for three weeks in January 2019, just as Luther musicians have every four years since 1977.

The Vienna residency included daily rehearsals and a course on current and historical performances in Vienna led by professors Melanie Batoff (music history) and Philip Borter (cello). Coursework included visits to museums, concert halls, and attending concerts, including Verdi's Falstaff at the Staatsoper, the Vienna State Opera House, and evening performances of the Vienna Symphony Orchestra at the world-renowned Musikverein and Konzerthaus.

On free evenings, many students queued up to get reduced-price tickets to many other top-tier concerts. Conductor Daniel Baldwin, who saw several operas with students over the course of the trip, said, "You can hear great opera in lots of places, but to hear the Vienna Philharmonic play in the pit really sets it apart. It helps our students become aware of the highest standard in the world, of what world-class means when it comes to music-making."

While music was the heart and soul of the residency, students also took in some distinctive Viennese traditions during the month. They relaxed at Europe's biggest and most modern thermal spa, located south of Vienna, and attended a formal Officers' Ball at the Hofburg Imperial Palace, which required black-tie attire and had nine separate rooms dedicated to dancing.

Students enjoyed sightseeing beyond Vienna as well. Some took side trips to Prague and Budapest, and the entire group spent two days in Salzburg, where they visited Mozart's birthplace and other famous sites. The orchestra also traveled to Eisenstadt, Austria, and Bratislava, Slovakia, where they gave evening performances.

The highlight of the residency was Luther's performance in Vienna's breathtaking Musikverein, one of the finest concert halls in the world. Before the concert, Baldwin prepared in the same room where Claudio Abbado and Leonard Bernstein, two of his musical heroes, had dressed.

Performing in such a beautiful concert hall was both a high-pressure and exhilarating experience for the Luther ensemble. Baldwin knew that it was daunting for an American college orchestra—only half of whom are music majors—to perform on such an iconic stage, in a city that holds music in such high esteem. But the group had been practicing during their residency for almost five hours a day, and it showed in their fantastic performance that night.

After a cross-continental journey, dozens of cultural excursions, thrilling weekend side trips, nearly three weeks of rigorous practice, and a triumphant performance, students left Vienna with new friends, new memories, and a deeper appreciation for the transformative power of the highest and best kind of musical expression.
